Annual General Meeting 2013

Our AGM was held in the convivial surroundings of the Theodore Bullfrog pub in central London, with guest speaker [Gillian Mawson](#), historian and author of 'Guernsey Evacuees: The Forgotten Evacuees of the Second World War'. After lunch and the AGM business, which included the election of officers and changes to the Society's constitution, (more of this later), Gillian gave an absorbing and interesting talk on how the chance discovery of an old press cutting from World War 2 concerning Guernsey evacuees in Bury led to her starting an oral history project that, by way of a masters degree, ended in the publication of her first book. It was certainly one of our more memorable and thought-provoking talks and a fitting subject for our anniversary year. Gillian's oral history project recently won third-prize in the third prize in the EMC Heritage Trust competition which will enable her to start putting these amazing stories and images on a dedicated website.

AGM – Changes to Constitution

The meeting agreed to changes to the constitution which bring it up-to-date and, we hope, will see us through the next seventy years and beyond! The changes are as detailed below, and any

member who wishes to have a full copy of the constitution please contact the secretary, Philip Green, at networks@guernsey-society.org.uk or write to him at the address in 'The Review'.

Change 1: Membership, Section 3ii:

From '*being husband and wife*' to 'being partners sharing the same address'.

Change 2: Finance, Section 5e:

From 'The Bank Account shall be in the name of the Society *with the STANDARD CHARTERED BANK LTD of 38 BISHOPSGATE, LONDON EC2N 4AH*' to 'with any such bank as the Council shall from time-to-time decide', and: All such cheques and any other documents must be signed '*by any two of the three authorised signatories*' to 'by any two of the authorised signatories'.

Occupation Words competition attracts wide range of entries

MORE than 300 students entered an Occupation Words competition organised by The Guernsey Society. The awards were presented last night at Castle Cornet.

The competition, which was also supported by Guernsey Museums, was open to Years 3 to 6 with a first, second and third prize for each year.

The competition coincided with Key Stage 2 history lessons being taught throughout Bailiwick schools. Students were asked to submit a piece of writing about the Occupation, either in the form of a story, newspaper report, letter or diary entry, with an illustration.

Keith Le Page, chairman of the Guernsey Society, said the competition also marked its 70th anniversary.

'It is the first time we have teamed up with Guernsey Museums and the competition has been very successful, with over 300 entries.'

The judging panel comprised Priaulx Library chief librarian Amanda Bennett, Guernsey FC chairman Steve Dewsnip, Guernsey Press editor Richard Digard, Guernsey Museums access and learning manager Jo Dowding, former Castel School head teacher and deputy chief education officer George Foote and Guernsey Society council member and Review of The Guernsey Society editor Michael Paul.

Miss Dowding said the entries included a variety of genres, including adventure stories. La Houquette Primary was given a special award for being the school with the most entries. It won £100 to spend on books in the Guernsey Museums shops.

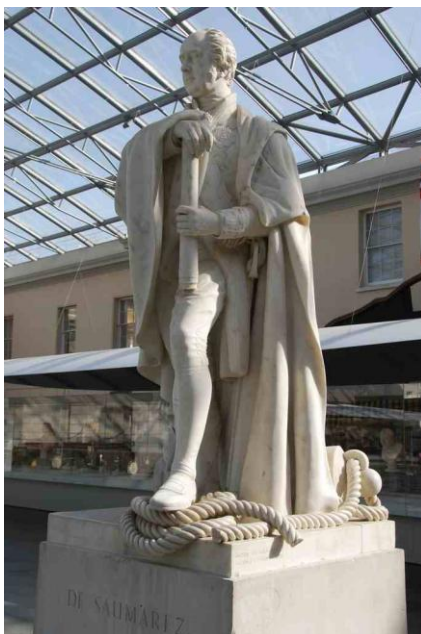
